UNDERSTANDING THE THEMES IN A POEM BY WILLIAM WORDSWORTH

THIS POEM'S OPTIMISTIC TONE ALSO SETS IT APART FROM DARKER OR MORE INTROSPECTIVE WORKS OF THE TIME. ITS CELEBRATION OF NATURAL BEAUTY AS A SOURCE OF JOY ALIGNS WITH WORDSWORTH'S PHILOSOPHICAL STANCE THAT NATURE NURTURES THE HUMAN SPIRIT, A CONCEPT ECHOED IN HIS PREFACE TO "LYRICAL BALLADS."

PROS AND CONS OF WORDSWORTH'S STYLE IN THIS POEM
