The pages of the manuscript were smuggled out of Vietnam while Cardinal Van Thuan was imprisoned and secretly printed as *The Road of Hope*. It was instantly popular with the

Vietnam people (both Christians and non-Christians) despite the government's attempts to halt its distribution. Many of the "Boat People" brought this book with them on their perilous journey. The book was translated into English and French, where it also met with instant popularity. Cardinal Van Thuan spent the last fourteen years of his life in Rome, and during that time he was able to revise and edit the book into its present form.
