HALAL AND HARAM: DEFINING PERMISSIBLE AND FORBIDDEN FOODS

APART FROM PORK AND BLOOD, ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE ALSO CONSIDERED HARAM (FORBIDDEN). THE HISTORICAL CONTEXT OF THESE PROHIBITIONS RELATES NOT ONLY TO HEALTH AND HYGIENE BUT ALSO TO SPIRITUAL PURITY AND OBEDIENCE TO DIVINE COMMANDMENTS.
