- MOVE YOUR HAND OUTWARD IN A SMOOTH, OPEN MOTION, AS IF YOU ARE SAYING "HERE YOU GO" OR "MY PLEASURE."

THIS GESTURE SYMBOLIZES THE IDEA OF "YOU'RE WELCOME" AS A COURTEOUS RESPONSE TO THANKS. IT'S SIMPLE, ELEGANT, AND WIDELY UNDERSTOOD.

OTHER VARIATIONS AND RELATED SIGNS

BESIDES THE BASIC SIGN, THERE ARE ALTERNATIVE WAYS TO EXPRESS "YOU'RE WELCOME" OR SIMILAR SENTIMENTS IN ASL:

How Do You Say Your Welcome in Sign Language Around the World?

WHILE AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE IS POPULAR AND WIDELY USED IN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA, OTHER COUNTRIES

HAVE THEIR OWN UNIQUE SIGN LANGUAGES, EACH WITH ITS OWN WAY OF EXPRESSING "YOU'RE WELCOME."

BRITISH SIGN LANGUAGE (BSL)

AUSLAN USERS TYPICALLY EXPRESS "YOU'RE WELCOME" BY COMBINING SIGNS FOR "THANK YOU" WITH A HEAD NOD AND A SLIGHT HAND MOVEMENT TO INDICATE ACCEPTANCE OR ACKNOWLEDGMENT.

LEARNING THESE VARIATIONS IS ESSENTIAL FOR ANYONE INTERESTED IN SIGN LANGUAGES GLOBALLY OR WHO INTERACTS WITH DEAF COMMUNITIES FROM DIFFERENT COUNTRIES.
