lorenzo dow turner margaret wade lewis: The Crucible of Carolina Michael Montgomery, 1994 The ten essays in *The Crucible of Carolina* explore the connections between the language and culture of South Carolina's barrier islands, West Africa, the Caribbean, and England. Decades before

any formal, scholarly interest in South Carolina barrier life, outsiders had been commenting on and documenting the African qualities of the region's black inhabitants. These qualities have long been manifest in their language, religious practices, music, and material culture. Although direct contact between South Carolina and Africa continued until the Civil War, the era of Caribbean contact was briefer and ended with the close of the American colonial period. Throughout this volume, though, the contributors look beyond the cultural motivations and political appeal of strengthening the links between coastal Carolina and Africa and examine the cost of a diminished recognition of this important Caribbean influence. Not surprisingly, the influence of the pioneering linguist Lorenzo Dow Turner is reflected in many of these essays. The work presented in this volume, however, moves beyond Turner in dealing with the discourse and stylistic aspects of Gullah; in relating patterns of Gullah to other Anglophone creoles and to various processes of creolization; and in questioning the usefulness of retention, survival, and continuity as operational concepts in comparative research. Within this context of furthering and challenging Turner's work in the barrier islands, and in seeking a truer measure of both African and Caribbean influences there, the contributors cover such topics as names and naming, the language of religious rituals, basket-making traditions, creole discourse patterns, and the grammatical morphology of Gullah and related creole and pidgin languages. Other contributors consider the substrate contributions and African continuities to be found in New World language patterns into new patterns adapted to the various situations in the New World. Opening new and advancing previous areas of research, *The Crucible of Carolina* also contributes to a further appreciation of the richness and diversity of South Carolina's cultural heritage.

Fields-Black, 2024 *COMBEE* is based upon original research and offers the first full account of Tubman's Civil War service and the Combahee River Raid. It is therefore a double comparison: between four Americans and between Americans and scholars based in Brazil.

Waegner, 2022-08-22 Discrimination, stigmatization, xenophobia, heightened securitization – fear and blaming of aliens within – characterize the world infected by COVID-19. Such fears have a long cultural history, however, particularly in connecting pathology with race, poverty, and migration. This volume explores theory and narratives of disease, danger, and displacement through the lenses of cultural, literary, and film studies, historical representation, ethnics studies, sociology and cultural geography, classics, music, and linguistics. If sugar fueled the economic hegemony of North Europe in the 18th and 19th century, rice fed it. Nowhere has this story been a more integral part of the landscape than Low Country of the coasts of Georgia, South and North Carolina. Rice played a key role in the expansion of slavery in the Carolinas during the 18th century as West African captives were enslaved, in part for their expertise in growing rice. Contributors to this volume explore the varied genealogies of rice cultivation in the Low Country through archaeological, anthropological, and historical research.
