AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE FOR MORE: UNLOCKING DEEPER COMMUNICATION

WHAT DOES "MORE" MEAN IN AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE?

THE SIGN FOR "MORE" IN ASL IS STRAIGHTFORWARD BUT INCREDIBLY USEFUL. IT IS OFTEN USED IN EVERYDAY CONVERSATIONS, ESPECIALLY WHEN EXPRESSING A DESIRE FOR AN ADDITIONAL QUANTITY OF SOMETHING—LIKE MORE FOOD, MORE TIME, OR MORE INFORMATION. THE SIGN IS MADE BY BRINGING THE FINGERTIPS OF BOTH HANDS TOGETHER REPEATEDLY, RESEMBLING THE ACTION OF GATHERING OR ACCUMULATING SOMETHING.

UNDERSTANDING THIS SIGN GOES BEYOND JUST ITS PHYSICAL MOVEMENT. IN ASL, "MORE" CAN BE USED IN VARIOUS CONTEXTS, FROM ASKING POLITELY FOR AN EXTRA PORTION OF A MEAL TO INDICATING THAT YOU WANT TO CONTINUE AN ACTIVITY. THIS VERSATILITY MAKES "MORE" A FOUNDATIONAL WORD IN ASL VOCABULARY, PARTICULARLY FOR BEGINNERS AIMING TO COMMUNICATE EFFECTIVELY.

HOW TO SIGN "MORE" CORRECTLY

TO PERFORM THE ASL SIGN FOR "MORE":

1. SHAPE BOTH HANDS INTO FLAT "O" FORMS—FINGERTIPS TOUCHING.
2. BRING THE FINGERTIPS OF BOTH HANDS TOGETHER IN THE CENTER, THEN SLIGHTLY SEPARATE THEM.
3. REPEAT THIS MOTION AS NEEDED TO EMPHASIZE "MORE."

IT'S A SIMPLE MOTION BUT HIGHLY EXPRESSIVE. THE REPETITION CAN ALSO ADD EMPHASIS, MUCH LIKE RAISING YOUR VOICE WHEN YOU SPEAK ENGLISH.

WHY LEARNING "MORE" ENHANCES YOUR ASL SKILLS

MASTERING THE SIGN FOR "MORE" HELPS LEARNERS IN SEVERAL KEY WAYS. FIRSTLY, IT INTRODUCES THE CONCEPT OF QUANTITY AND CONTINUATION, WHICH IS A BUILDING BLOCK FOR MORE COMPLEX SENTENCES. SECONDLY, "MORE" FREQUENTLY PAIRS WITH OTHER SIGNS TO CREATE COMPOUND PHRASES, SUCH AS "MORE FOOD," "MORE PLAY," OR "MORE HELP."

IN ADDITION, LEARNING "MORE" ENHANCES YOUR UNDERSTANDING OF ASL'S VISUAL AND SPATIAL NATURE. UNLIKE SPOKEN ENGLISH, WHERE YOU RELY HEAVILY ON SOUND, ASL DEPENDS ON FACIAL EXPRESSIONS, HAND SHAPES, AND BODY LANGUAGE. FOR EXAMPLE, WHEN SIGNING "MORE," A SLIGHT NOD OR EAGER FACIAL EXPRESSION CAN CONVEY ENTHUSIASM OR URGENCY.

COMMON PHRASES USING “MORE” IN ASL

TO GET THE MOST OUT OF YOUR PRACTICE, TRY COMBINING “MORE” WITH THESE COMMONLY USED SIGNS:

- ****MORE + FOOD****: INDICATING YOU WANT ADDITIONAL FOOD.
- ****MORE + HELP****: REQUESTING FURTHER ASSISTANCE.
- ****MORE + PLAY****: ASKING TO CONTINUE PLAYING.
- ****MORE + TIME****: WANTING EXTRA TIME FOR AN ACTIVITY.

BY PAIRING “MORE” WITH RELATED SIGNS, YOU INCREASE YOUR COMMUNICATIVE RANGE WITHOUT NEEDING TO LEARN A COMPLETELY NEW VOCABULARY ITEM FOR EACH SITUATION.

THE ROLE OF NON-MANUAL SIGNALS IN EXPRESSING “MORE”

A UNIQUE ASPECT OF AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE IS THE USE OF NON-MANUAL SIGNALS (NMS) TO ADD MEANING. THESE INCLUDE FACIAL EXPRESSIONS, HEAD MOVEMENTS, AND BODY POSTURE. WHEN SIGNING “MORE,” YOUR FACIAL EXPRESSION CAN DRASTICALLY AFFECT THE TONE:

- ****NEUTRAL OR POLITE****: WHEN CASUALLY ASKING FOR MORE OF SOMETHING.
- ****EXCITED OR EAGER****: WHEN YOU REALLY WANT MORE, LIKE A CHILD ASKING FOR ANOTHER COOKIE.
- ****URGENT OR SERIOUS****: WHEN YOU NEED MORE HELP OR SOMETHING IMMEDIATELY.

INCORPORATING NMS HELPS CONVEY YOUR EMOTIONS AND INTENT, MAKING YOUR SIGNING MORE AUTHENTIC AND UNDERSTANDABLE TO NATIVE ASL USERS.

EXPANDING BEYOND “MORE”: RELATED SIGNS TO KNOW

WHILE “MORE” IS A GREAT SIGN TO START WITH, AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE OFFERS MANY OTHER WORDS AND PHRASES THAT BUILD ON THIS CONCEPT OF ADDITION OR CONTINUATION. HERE ARE SOME RELATED SIGNS THAT CAN HELP YOU BROADEN YOUR SKILLS:

“ALL DONE”

OFTEN USED IN CONTRAST WITH “MORE,” “ALL DONE” INDICATES THAT NO ADDITIONAL QUANTITY OR ACTION IS DESIRED. IT’S SIGNED BY HOLDING BOTH HANDS UP AND MOVING THEM OUTWARD, SHAKING THE HANDS SLIGHTLY. THIS SIGN IS ESPECIALLY USEFUL IN SETTINGS LIKE MEALTIME OR PLAYTIME.

“ENOUGH”

TO EXPRESS THAT YOU HAVE REACHED YOUR LIMIT OR DON’T WANT ANY MORE, THE SIGN FOR “ENOUGH” IS HELPFUL. THIS IS DONE BY BRINGING ONE FLAT HAND DOWN ONTO THE OTHER FLAT HAND IN A CHOPPING MOTION.

“AGAIN” OR “REPEAT”

IF YOU WANT TO ASK FOR SOMETHING TO BE DONE ONCE MORE, LIKE REPEATING AN ACTION OR PHRASE, THE SIGN FOR “AGAIN” CAN BE PAIRED WITH “MORE” TO CLARIFY YOUR REQUEST.

TIPS FOR PRACTICING AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE FOR MORE EFFECTIVELY

LEARNING ASL, LIKE ANY LANGUAGE, REQUIRES PRACTICE AND IMMERSION. HERE ARE SOME TIPS TO HELP YOU MASTER THE SIGN FOR "MORE" AND USE IT COMFORTABLY IN CONVERSATION:

- **PRACTICE IN CONTEXT:** USE "MORE" DURING REAL-LIFE INTERACTIONS, LIKE ASKING FOR MORE FOOD OR MORE TIME TO COMPLETE A TASK.

THIS EARLY EXPOSURE HIGHLIGHTS THE IMPORTANCE OF "MORE" AS A BUILDING BLOCK FOR EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION AND SOCIAL INTERACTION.

REQUEST. FOR EXAMPLE, WHEN ASKING "MORE?" WITH RAISED EYEBROWS, A SIGNER IS INQUIRING IF THE OTHER PERSON WANTS ADDITIONAL ITEMS OR INFORMATION.

THIS INTERPLAY BETWEEN MANUAL SIGNS AND NMMs ENRICHES COMMUNICATION AND CAN BE CHALLENGING FOR LEARNERS ACCUSTOMED TO SPOKEN LANGUAGES WHERE INTONATION SERVES THIS FUNCTION. MASTERY OF THESE ELEMENTS IS CRITICAL FOR FLUENCY AND NATURAL INTERACTION WITHIN DEAF COMMUNITIES.

TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANCES AND LEARNING RESOURCES

WITH THE RISE OF DIGITAL PLATFORMS, LEARNING ASL, INCLUDING SIGNS LIKE "MORE," HAS BECOME MORE ACCESSIBLE. VIDEO TUTORIALS, MOBILE APPS, AND VIRTUAL CLASSROOMS OFFER DYNAMIC WAYS TO PRACTICE AND RECEIVE FEEDBACK ON SIGNING.
