SELECTION OF THE PATIENT The most common candidates for princess pen procedures are patients with aging skin. These procedures are usually done to even out wrinkles and static lines (such as marionette lines and nasolabial folds), more so in the lower two-thirds of the patient's face. They can also be carried out to achieve facial contouring and augmentation, as is usually the case for lip enhancement. The practitioners should always set the expectation in the patient that dermal fillers will strictly serve to reduce wrinkles and lines rather than remove them, and while it is possible to achieve slight improvements in contours, but will not produce surgery-like outcomes. Patients who have too many wrinkles, folds, and skin laxity might need surgical procedures for marked improvements. It is important to note that patient who exhibits body dysmorphic disorder, depression, narcissism, or those with impractical or unattainable expectations are not candidates for dermal fillers as these patients are predisposed to unhappiness and dissatisfaction (Ferneini and Bennett 2018).
