FEATURES OF AN EFFECTIVE COME SIGHT WORD WORKSHEET

VARIETY OF ACTIVITIES

REPETITION WITH VARIATION

REPETITION IS KEY WHEN LEARNING SIGHT WORDS, BUT IT SHOULD BE PRESENTED IN VARIED FORMATS TO HOLD ATTENTION. WORKSHEETS THAT REVISIT THE WORD “COME” MULTIPLE TIMES THROUGHOUT DIFFERENT EXERCISES HELP SOLIDIFY MEMORY WITHOUT BECOMING MONOTONOUS.
