PERSONIFICATION AND ITS EMOTIONAL IMPACT

PERSONIFICATION APPEARS SPARINGLY BUT EFFECTIVELY IN *ANTHEM*, OFTEN TO ANIMATE ABSTRACT CONCEPTS OR NATURAL ELEMENTS THAT INTERACT WITH THE PROTAGONIST.
